Sign Language in Early Childhood Classrooms (repeat session)

Emergent Curriculum—Experiencing the Cycle

Presenter **Susan Stacey** has been in the field for over 30 years, as a teacher, director, college professor and writer. She often works with ECEs addressing topics such as, documentation, reflective practice, emergent curriculum, and Reggio inspired approaches. Susan currently teaches Junior Primary at the Halifax Grammar School and is the author of *Emergent Curriculum in Early Childhood Settings*.

Cost: \$120 for Workshop Series

This three-part series is a unique opportunity to experience the complete cycle of Emergent Curriculum and to practice its components.

In the first (full day) session, using real-life examples, we will review the basics of Emergent Curriculum so that we are beginning with a shared understanding and vocabulary. We will work with observations, and how to use them – including which ones are useful, how to respond to them, which part of the day our response would fit into, and what to do next. We will also examine the power of reflection, and take the time to experience this 'middle' part of Emergent Curriculum which is so often missing.

In the first follow-up session, held in the evening, we will use participants' own experiences and encounters from their everyday work, and think about how to scaffold whatever is happening. This will be in the format of a 'Master Class,' often used in the Arts, where participants share and discuss their work in order to gather support from others.

In the final session, we will complete documentation of our work, using the participants' real experiences. This will involve reflection and brainstorming about what to include in documentation, how we make those choices, and the various forms that the documentation might take.

The College will accept in-person debit or credit card payments, in addition to cash or cheque.
